Ask and You Shall Receive

Jack & Pam Baker: Always Ready to Step In and Help

As the grandson of Henry Baker, Sr., who in 1914 founded Crystal Rock, the oldest bottled water company in Connecticut, Jack Baker was raised to believe that obligations come with opportunity.

"We are fortunate to be on the giving side," said Jack who is executive vice president and director of the company. "It makes for a full life."

Jack and his wife Pam enjoy living and giving in our corner of the state focusing their philanthropy on education, environment and the arts.

"We are lucky to live in a beautiful place and we want to keep it that way," said Pam. "It feels good to give to something local. We can see and feel the impact of our giving and take ownership of issues that are important to us."

Having served on the Evaluation Committee, Jack was familiar with CCF. He later joined the Board of Trustees in 2007.

"We felt comfortable starting a fund here," said Jack. "The Foundation is professionally run and has high integrity. We know that our fund will forever help the community even when we are no longer around."

"Jack and Pam have been tremendously generous to the community through the Foundation," said CEO, Ingrid Manning. "It's rare that the Bakers turn away from any opportunity that we present to them to make life better in our region."

In 2009, the Bakers contributed to an emergency fund raising initiative at CCF to help towns respond to residents struggling with the economic crisis. That year, Jack and Pam also were major donors to the newly-established Community College Scholarship Fund at CCF.

"We like supporting non-traditional students and making education available to those who might not otherwise have the opportunity," said Jack. "Maybe they were not at the top of their class, or are returning to further their education. These are the students who will stay here and work in our community."

In 2010, Warren Parks & Recreation started a scholarship fund at CCF for high school graduates from town with proceeds raised at a 5K Cider Run. A resident of Warren and a CCF trustee, Jack stepped in and encouraged Warren residents to support the new fund.

"We liked the criteria for the scholarship," said Pam. "It's not based on scholastics. You just have to be a student from Warren."

The Little School That Could

Children's Community School Teaches Students the Three Rs and to Believe in Themselves

Agency Endowment at CCF Helps Pay for Teachers, Rent

Getting hugs from her students everyday, Barbara Ruggiero, Ph.D, or "Dr. Barbara" as her students call her, claims she has the best job in the world running Waterbury's only private, non-religious school for inner-city, low-income students.

"Children's Community School offers a valuable alternative for kids of very limited resources," she said. "We get to change the lives of our kids in many important ways."

The school charges families \$350, or only 4 percent of the \$7,500 tuition.

With the exception of state funding for their preschool program, and help from the federal nutrition program, Children's Community School is privately funded. Since 1989, the school has received close to \$300,000 in grants through the Connecticut Community Foundation's LitLinks Early Childhood Education Initiative; unrestricted, designated and advised funds established by area donors; and partner funder Naugatuck Savings Bank Foundation.

The school also relies on the distributions from the Children's Community School Endowment Fund at the Foundation to cover expenses like teacher salaries and rent. To date, the school has received close to \$470,000 from their fund.

The endowment was established at the Foundation in 1991 with money raised from a capital campaign.

"We never knew where our next dollars were coming from," remembered Carole Cunningham,

who served on the board at the time and is currently an associate board member. "We needed to do something."

School leadership hired a local consultant to help them run a capital campaign. He said that if they were going to raise funds, they would need a place to put the money.

"The Foundation was a natural vehicle for us," said Carole. "They were always very supportive of the school and we trusted the Foundation to successfully manage and invest our endowment."

With 130 students from pre-K to fifth grade, class sizes average 16 students. Accredited by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges, Children's Community School is bridging the achievement gap commonly found in urban schools.

"The investment in early education is critical," added Dr. Barbara. "A majority of our students are reading at or above their grade level, and most of our students go on to graduate from high school on time."

But the responsibility for success in school lies ultimately in every student.

"We give the children a sense that they can control their own destiny," Dr. Barbara said. "We tell them, 'You have the power to make choices for yourself, to create your own life.'"

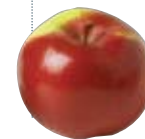

is Where Their Heart Is

Mark and Nikki Yanarella Concentrate Their Time, Talents and Charitable Dollars in Naugatuck



Growing up, raising a family and working in Naugatuck, you could say that Mark and Nikki Yanarella have a soft spot for the Borough.

“Being part of a community, you need to contribute any way you can,” said Mark. “If you can give financially, that’s great. If not, there are other ways.”

Giving to the community is something that Mark “just learned” from his parents and from his 41 years working at Naugatuck Savings Bank where he is president and CEO.

“My parents volunteered and it’s part of the culture I grew up with at the bank. In a small community like ours, there are a lot of opportunities to get involved.”

Friends of the Connecticut Community Foundation since 2000, the Yanarellas have been extremely generous to their hometown with their time, talents and charitable dollars. Mark served as a trustee from 2001 to 2006 and on the Audit, Evaluation and Executive committees. Nikki was a member of the Grants Committee.

“Of all the boards I have served on, the Foundation’s was the most interesting,” remembered Mark. “Everyone was very professional. I met nice people who brought a lot to the table.”

Through their donor-advised fund at CCF, Mark likes to support nonprofits that serve Naugatuck residents in health care, economic development and the arts. Nikki, who was a kindergarten teacher in Naugatuck for 20 years, is passionate about early childhood education and literacy.

A daughter of a builder, Nikki stated, “If you give children a strong foundation early in life, they can build from there. If they don’t have that, the foundation will crack as they get older.”

In 2003, CCF enlisted Nikki and Mark’s help to introduce the LitLinks early childhood education initiative to the Naugatuck community. Since then, LitLinks has awarded more than \$31,000 in grants to provide professional development for preschool and kindergarten teachers and to improve literacy and kindergarten readiness in Naugatuck.

Grantees include Naugatuck Discovery, a program of United Way of Naugatuck and Beacon Falls to help children succeed in their social, emotional and academic development.

Nikki served as chair of Naugatuck Discovery when it launched in 2002. “When Nikki takes on something, she is passionate about it,” said Lisa Shappy, executive director, United Way. Nikki has demonstrated her passion every Friday morning for the last five years leading a story hour for preschoolers and parents at the Whittemore Library as a Naugatuck Discovery volunteer.

“It’s a win-win program,” said Nikki. “Children discover the joy of reading and parents get to connect with their kids.”

For Nikki, story hour is a win for her too.

“To have a small child hug you and say ‘thank you’ gives me joy. To see them smile and hear them laugh warms my heart. It’s all I need to make my day.”

Our Largest Gift Ever

In November of 2009, the Board of Trustees of East Hill Woods, Inc. (EHW) established the East Hill Woods Fund at CCF with a contribution of \$9.2 million — our largest gift ever.

The EHW Fund is the result of the sale of East Hill Woods, Inc., a nonprofit corporation, to Watermark at East Hill, a for-profit certified continuing care retirement community in Southbury.

As per the donors' wishes, the fund will award grants to area nonprofits that provide services for seniors living in CCF's 21-town service area. A portion of the fund also will be designated to train and educate managers of continuing care retirement communities.

Emergency Funds Awarded

Members of the EHW Fund advisory committee including Lee Sherman, John Michaels, Rep. Arthur O'Neill, Joe Vannucci, and Craig Lifland, wanted to be certain that needy seniors would immediately receive assistance while CCF began to conduct a needs assessment. They recommended \$100,000 in grants to 21-towns in our region to help individual seniors who were struggling to pay for prescriptions, utilities, and other critical needs.

Associate CEO, Carol O'Donnell said that CCF disbursed the funds quickly based on documented need such as each town's percentage of seniors on food stamps and seniors over 80, many of whom, because of their age, have greater needs.

Funding guidelines were flexible to allow individual town social service staff to respond quickly to the often unique needs of residents.

Focus Groups Bring Senior Issues to Light

Close to 240 seniors, social service providers, municipal leaders, senior center directors, health professionals and others gathered in eight focus groups to identify issues and priorities for action. The energy and enthusiasm generated at these forums were palpable as participants struggled to select priorities upon which we could make a measurable impact. While home maintenance, home health care and fear of isolation emerged as the three top priorities, the issue that echoed throughout the focus groups was seniors' lack of connection to information and services.

Armed With Results

Armed with the results, the advisory committee set the fund's goals and strategies.

"CCF was able to make our vision of this fund a reality," said Michaels. "They brought the right people in the community together to help us determine the best way to put this fund into action and start helping seniors and the organizations that serve them right away."

"By reaching out to the community in the last year, we better understand the needs of our area seniors, learned more about existing resources that are in place for them, and were able to generate ideas for addressing the needs," noted Carol O'Donnell, associate CEO at CCF.

"We will make a bigger impact and help seniors more effectively by focusing our funding on strengthening networks of information and services that are easily accessible to seniors. Through the strategic use of these funds, we are adding value to state, regional and local efforts aimed at helping seniors remain in their homes."

Communicating Priorities

In December, CCF followed up with area nonprofits and hosted information sessions about the EHW Fund's grant-making priorities in Cheshire, Waterbury, Southbury, New Milford and Litchfield.

Community Leadership Initiative Launched

Beginning in spring 2011, the EHW Fund will award grants to organizations that serve seniors in our region.

CCF aligns its grant-making strategies with specific quantifiable results. In this way, we make informed decisions on grant requests, assess progress towards specific goals and modify strategies to maximize impact.

In the coming year, CCF will track the number of participants connected to resources such as the CHOICES center at the Western Connecticut Area Agency on Aging, senior participation in programs, and related indicators of service accessibility and effectiveness.

Nonprofit Assistance Initiative

A joint program of CCF and the United Way of Greater Waterbury, the Nonprofit Assistance Initiative (NAI) helps nonprofits operate more efficiently and effectively.

NAI awarded grants totaling more than \$85,000 in 2010. Grants focused on technology, strategic planning and board development, and costs associated with the merger of New Opportunities and In The Making.

NAI offers a team of advisors with business savvy and extensive experience to consult with nonprofits on best practices that help them accomplish their mission, and meet the needs of their clients.

Brown-Garrison Memorial Scholarship Fund...\$133,044

Although they lived and worked in the Hartford area, Betty Garrison and Marion Brown always felt welcome in Thomaston. Visiting friends over the years, they grew to love the people and the town. As part of their legacy, Betty, who was a registered nurse at Hartford Hospital, and Marion, who worked at the State of Connecticut Judicial District of Hartford, wanted to leave something to help children in Thomaston.

Through their estates, they provided for each other first and then designated the establishment of the scholarship fund at the death of the survivor. After Marion's death, her estate distributed \$133,000 to establish the Brown-Garrison Scholarship Fund for graduating seniors of Thomaston High School.

Gibney Family Fund...\$1,000*

Dr. Raymond A. Gibney and Carole Gibney of Litchfield established the Gibney Family Fund to support education.

Having raised three sons together, the Gibneys believe in the importance of providing children with a quality education.

In the 1990s, Carole began volunteering as a tutor at Children's Community School, Waterbury's only private, non-religious school for inner-city, low-income students. "Working with the students at Children's Community School really made an impression on me," she recalled.

Carole went on to instruct adults as a GED tutor for Literacy Volunteers of America, and also served on an organizing committee for the LitLinks early childhood education initiative at CCF.

Hector Riollano Fund for Education...\$4,450*



Considered a father by young men in the Hispanic community, activist, mentor, loved grandfather and husband, Hector Riollano worked in the Waterbury schools for more than 30 years as a project manager and assistant principal.

Originally from Ponce, Puerto Rico, Riollano's involvement in the Waterbury community included holding after-school

programs to help kids with homework, talking to them about the importance of staying in school, and finding homes for boys needing a place to live.

Board of Education member Jose Morales knew Riollano since the age of 15 and was encouraged by him to attend college and run for election to the board. "Everything he did was because of his heart and his love for the community of Waterbury," Morales said.

The fund, established by his wife Dolores Riollano after he passed away in July 2010, will support after-school enrichment programs and mentoring for Hispanic students. The family requested contributions be made to the Fund in lieu of flowers.

Jeanette and Lawrence Matzkin Fund...\$15,000

Jeanette W. Matzkin, a former Naugatuck High School teacher, honored her husband Lawrence, a Waterbury native, in her estate by establishing a fund to provide scholarships for students in need to further their careers.

John L. and Jeanne C. Hughes Scholarship Fund...\$764,600

The estate of Jeanne C. Hughes of Southbury

established the John L. and Jeanne C. Hughes Scholarship Fund for undergraduate or graduate students who live in CCF's 21-town service area and are majoring in the liberal arts.

Jeanne C. Hughes established the John L. and Jeanne C. Hughes Fund through her estate. The unrestricted fund will be part of CCF's Regional Grant Fund which is used to address the identified needs in the community.

Southbury Community Trust Fund...\$1,604,850

In 2010, assets totaling \$1.6 million held in the Southbury Community Trust Fund (SCTF) at the Fairfield County Community Foundation were transferred to CCF. A local anonymous donor established SCTF in 1994 to support nonprofits that serve the Southbury community. CCF first

partnered with SCTF in 2008 to complete a needs assessment of the Southbury community, revise grant guidelines to better address those needs, and enhance grant-making services to nonprofits that serve the people of Southbury. CCF also managed SCTF grant making beginning that fall.

In 2009, SCTF started to focus its grant-making and capacity-building services in support of local nonprofits that offer youth development programs, address youth behavioral health needs, and provide social services for needy families with particular attention to food sufficiency. The fund also considers grants in the arts, community and economic development, education, the environment and health and human services.

An advisory committee of local community leaders recommends grant guidelines and awards grants made from the fund. Current advisory committee members include Shirley Michaels, chair; Patricia Altieri, Janice Creighton, Mary Kay Flaherty, Donald Kimber, Warren Malkin, Mark Mitchell, Doris Platt, Eric Polokoff, and Michael Reardon. Over the past 16 years, SCTF has awarded more than \$400,000 in grants to benefit Southbury residents.

(Competitive Field of Interest)

Warren Parks and Recreation Scholarship Fund...\$8,200*

The Warren Parks and Recreation Scholarship Committee created this fund to provide scholarships for students who are residents of Warren, graduating from high school, and planning to attend a 2 or 4 year accredited college, university, or technical school. Initial funds were raised through the 5K Cider Run in the fall of 2010.

(Restricted Scholarship)

Waterbury City Hall Rededication Fund...\$59,760



Waterbury's City Hall and its gardens were restored to their original grandeur in 2010 and rededicated on Jan. 1, 2011. Members of the Waterbury City Hall Rededication Committee established the Waterbury City Hall Garden Conservancy Fund to ensure that the gardens have funds for special projects in the future such as plantings and artwork.

Young People's Theatre Fund...\$13,175

For decades, Young People's Theatre operated as a nonprofit, all volunteer organization committed to providing professional, yet affordable live theatre to families in Greater Waterbury.

When the group dissolved in 2010, members decided to use the assets to create a fund to support performance arts throughout the Waterbury community.

"This fund will be the legacy of all the volunteers who were dedicated to our mission," said Sandra Barolli, a Middlebury resident and a volunteer for the organization for several years. "By establishing the fund, we look forward to seeing our name and mission continue."

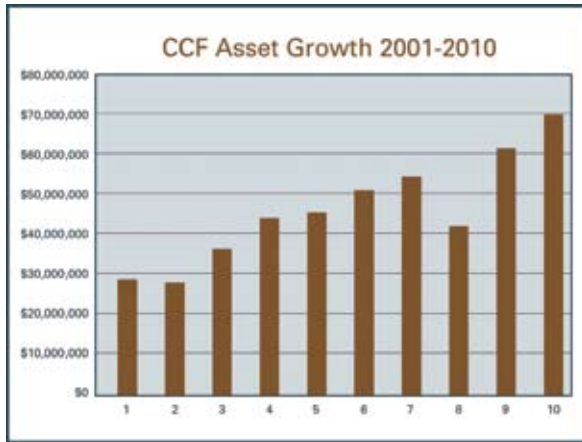

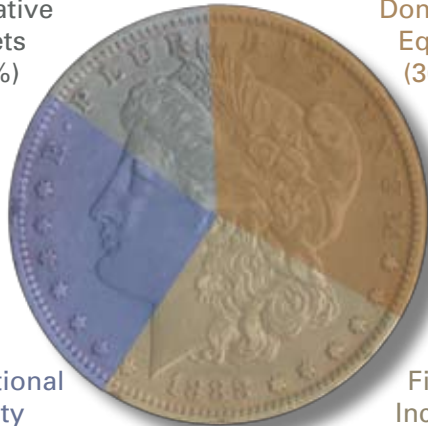
\$70 Million in Assets
